

MEDIA + ACADEMIA BIAS



The real test of the bias in academia revolves around who gets admitted to the faculty lounge.

"MSNBC television host, award-winning scholar and Wake Forest University alumna Melissa Harris-Perry ('94) will return this summer to her alma mater as a chaired professor," Wake Forest announced in an online press release on April 11, 2014.

"Melissa Harris-Perry is one of the nation's foremost intellectuals publicly exploring—and thoughtfully influencing—the intersections of politics, race, gender, religion and culture," Wake Forest Provost Rogan Kersh stated. "We are delighted that she has chosen to come home to Wake Forest and help ignite in our students the passion she has for contemporary political issues and social justice."

Previously, Harris-Perry taught at Tulane, the University of Chicago and Princeton. Conservative historians and

economists may have to start their own think tanks in order to ply their trade but apparently having the right attitude is enough to get you an academic berth.

Outside the classroom, Harris-Perry's observations border on the bizarre, even given the network she works for:

- "Over the weekend, MSNBC's Melissa Harris-Perry weighed in on the Affordable Care Act by saying that the term 'Obamacare' was actually meant to be a 'derogatory term,' conceived by 'wealthy white men,' to put themselves above a black man and to diminish his accomplishments," Accuracy in Media chairman Don Irvine reported on December 9, 2013.
- At the Take Back the American Dream conference in 2012, "Some conservative media attention has been focused on another speech at the conference, a rather bizarre presentation by MSNBC's Melissa Harris-Perry," Cliff Kincaid reported for AIM. "Predictably, as a black liberal, she described America as a racist nation. But this Tulane University professor went on to describe America's response to the 9/11 terrorist attacks as a search for a new 'racial enemy' and the 'imagined other,' as if Islamic terrorism did not exist."

As to what Harris-Perry teaches in the classroom, one of the trio of favorable reviews she got at Tulane on Rate



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My Professors.com offers a tantalizing hint: "MHP is an enthusiastic and intriguing professor. Her lectures are interesting (and usually filled with Beyonce references) and the class discussions are always stimulating. Overall her class is enjoyable but she does have a tendency to be a more harsh than necessary grader."

JOBS FOR HUMANITIES MAJORS?

As commencement approaches, this year's graduating seniors can look forward to pep talks about how employable humanities majors are.

"Upon graduating from college, those who majored in the humanities and social science made, on average, \$26,271 in 2010 and 2011, slightly more than those in science and mathematics but less than those in engineering and in professional and pre-professional fields," Vartan Gregorian writes in the Carnegie Reporter. "However, by their peak earning age of 56 to 60, these individuals earned \$66,185, putting them about \$2,000 ahead of professional and pre-professional majors in the same age bracket."

"Further, employers want to hire men and women who have the ability to think and act based on deep, wideranging knowledge. For example, the report [from the Association of American Colleges and Universities] finds that 93 percent of employers agree that candidates' demonstrated capacity to think critically, communicate clearly, and solve complex problems is more important than their undergraduate major, and 55 percent said that what they wanted from potential employees was both field-specific knowledge and skills and a broad range of knowledge and skills. Even more evidence of hiring managers' interest in richly educated individuals is the finding that four out of five employers agree that *all* students should acquire broad knowledge in the liberal arts and sciences."


SQUEAKY CHALK

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CHRIS MATTHEWS NIXED AT OHIO STATE

Obama was okay.

Even John Boehner passed muster.



But when word leaked out that MSNBC's Chris Matthews was this year's commencement speaker at Ohio State, there was a collective groan from many seniors on campus when they heard the

news, reported Jennifer Kabbany in the College Fix.

"Why are they doing this?" asked graduating senior/ Marine Corps veteran and psychology major Mark Green, who added that "I wouldn't mind if it was a sitting politician, even if it was a liberal. But I don't want to sit through a political commentator's speech that I don't agree with."

Green's opinions were echoed all over campus by students who believe that an irascible MSNBC *Hardball* anchor, who makes a living out of bashing Republicans and accusing those who dare to critique the president of racism, is hardly capable of providing an inspirational sendoff to this year's graduating seniors.

In a letter to the editor, senior Jake Bradley expressed disappointment in the school's decision, not based on Matthews' liberal ideology, but because "he is directly against open dialogue."

Also, Cody Rizzuto, a conservative University of Cincinnati student who is vice-chair of the Ohio College Republican Federation, called the Matthews selection a disservice to all students, maintaining that you don't want a commencement speaker who is simply "a talking head who makes points for the left."

All this dissent over commencement among graduating seniors would not have transpired had there been more input from students concerning this all-important choice of a speaker, a situation that will assuredly be remedied next year.

MONDO BIZARRO ON CAMPUS

Although the nests of radicals and other weasels have sucked most of the freedom of speech out of our college campuses, it is somehow comforting to discover the occasional emergence of a non-political prank reminiscent of the good old days of "Animal House."

Case in point: Notre Dame student Brian McCurren recently caused thousands of dollars in damages when he used a 100 lb. flower pot and a hammer to break into a South Bend massage parlor where he gorged on half a box of Hot Pockets and some drumstick ice cream cones, before "passing out while waiting for a Mac and Cheese to finish cooking," according to Before It's News and Tomonews.us. When police discovered him the following morning, they charged him with burglary, vandalism and underage drinking.

********A CALL TO ACTION

For years, those of us who have exposed and publicized the takeover of our college campuses by the radical left have noticed subtle changes in the demeanor of bright conservative students, who kept confronting the powerful forces arrayed against them. But eventually, even those courageous students gradually retreated into the woodwork, knowing that any public confrontation could be construed as harassment, which carried life-long implications that might affect their future. Many of them simply clammed up, and didn't mention a word about the totalitarian threats and intolerance on campus until they graduated – and perhaps not even then.

But proof that hope springs eternal surfaced several weeks ago when Kyle Brooks, a student at the U. of Wisconsin, Whitewater, decided he'd had enough. What caused him to make that decision was a guest lecturer at school – an SEIU member named Eyon Biddle – who claimed that "politics is fueled by white rage" and suggested that racism helped fuel the Republican victory in 2010. He took out his phone and documented the rant.

Writing in the College Fix, Brooks explained that his video not only went viral immediately but became

national news and prompted an outpouring of response from people nationwide, who were "hungry for the truth about what is happening in our universities."

Brooks is acquainted with this problem from the inside, because he lives with it every day. Getting a right-of-center speaker is harder than pulling teeth, but when a left-wing speaker tells a captive audience that Republicans are racists and America's problems are the fault of rich, racist, white conservatives – and these views are presented as facts, then it's time to stand up and expose it as hate speech.



After all, if a conservative Republican presided over a college class and made outrageous statements with no factual backup, he'd be run off the campus and out of town.

However, "since Eyon Biddle is liberal, the professor feels empowered to invite him to speak, knowing already what he plans to say, because the culture of the campus supports inaccurate rhetoric like Mr. Biddle's."

This feeling is so pervasive on American campuses that my professor didn't even consider if it would be appropriate to invite a conservative to give an alternative perspective to what Eyon Biddle said until the story went national. Had I not recorded the video, allowing the lecture to be heard by millions, Eyon Biddle's rant would have been the final word on the issue of race and politics in that class of young people whose political identity is being molded during these crucial years.

Brooks then claimed that all young conservatives – and just "normal people who know right from wrong should feel emboldened to stand up to outrageous bias and left-wing hate" wherever it presents itself. "College students should not be afraid to pull out their phones and begin recording an extreme lecture, even if their grade and reputation among the administration will suffer."

Brooks then took a stand that may inspire his peers to follow suit: "If we want to see positive change, so colleges once again are fair places where scholarly free thought and expression are promoted, we need to stand up and reject far left radicalism in our classrooms. Students and parents need to let professors know that we will no longer tolerate bias that smears conservatism as racist and hateful. It takes courage and resolve, but if we as conservatives demand change, and declare enough is enough, than the left-wing campus culture will finally begin to turn around."

Noting that "conservative policies promote the most economic growth and prosperity, which improve the lives of every American, especially the poorest among us," he stressed that

"I don't know a single Republican who wouldn't vote for somebody because they were of a different race. Conservatives come from all backgrounds, and are united by a common belief that small government will increase prosperity and help all people. Rants like Eyon Biddle's to my class seize on



politics of division, to pit Americans against each other to help one side win elections, and distorts realities and damages our country."
